Miss Ellaneous is an original Darwin Diva. Beginning her fabulous glittery journey in 2002, Miss Ellaneous (also known as MissE) has had an extensive career on and off the stage preformed extensively has throughout Australia and internationally the UK and Indonesia. Known for her powerful and dynamic performances, Miss Ellaneous has established herself as one of this country's finest Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Drag Queens. She is the co-owner and director of Party Passport, which produces national and international events, parties and gatherings. Some of MissE's highlights include performing with Taylor Mac in the 2017 Melbourne Festival, The Dreaming Festival 'Constantina Bush and the Bushettes' and in 2013 & 2015 with the ensemble from the all female hit show, 'Hot Brown Honey'. Miss Ellaneous is a regular performer in Darwin and can be seen as host online regular with NITV.

TOPP MOB (AUS)

'TOPP Mob' are a collective of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander young people from Digi Youth Arts who perform as hosts for The Original Peoples' Party (TOPP); including an original percussion piece as a 'Call to TOPP'. The collective is also fulfilling volunteer roles throughout APAM. TOPP Mob have been supported by the composition of Jhindu-Pedro Lawrie and costume design by Hannah Brontë under the direction by Alethea Beetson.

INFINITE DAKOTA (GUA)

Dåkot-ta Alcantara-Camacho was born in Snohomish Territory and raised in Tscha-kolechy. Their lineage comes from Låguas yan Gåni (the archipelago known as the Marianas Islands, and specifically the largest island known as Guåhan - incorrectly pronounced as Guam by the Western world). Dåkot-ta grew up in the Seattle hip hop underground and social justice movement exercising a lifelong passion and skill for rap. In 2016, on completion of a Masters of Performance Studies at Tisch School of the Arts at NYU. Dåkot-ta founded The Matao New Performance Project and premiered FANHASSO at the Festival of the Pacific Arts 2016. Dåkot-ta has been the primary composer, graphic & web designer, video editor and technician for I Moving Lab. Last year, Dåkot-ta released their first fulllength album, Nå'lå'la - meaning "give life".

ELECTRIC FIELDS (AUS)

ERIC AVERY (AUS)

Eric Avery is a Ngiyampaa, Yuin, and Gumbangirr Mayi. Eric's parents grew up in Redfern, Alexandria and surrounds, and Eric's Grandparents where the first of their families to move to Sydney from North / Western NSW and the NSW North Coast. Eric Grew up in Southern and Eastern Sydney learning of his mother and father's connection to country (Yuin, Gumbangirr, Ngiyampaa). In the last 7 years Eric has been able to connect with his Father's side of the family, revitalising family ties, singing and continuance of culture.

Music Improvisation for Violin and Voice with Movement No 1.

This piece is semi improvised with Ngiyampaa, Yuin and Gumbangirr language words as well as Koori Slang interacting with the Bach Partitas for Solo violin as a focal point instigating a semi improvised musical performance discourse between Aboriginal Language and Western Music.

The Partitas for Solo Violin are some of the most important pieces written for the violin and is a focal point for a vast majority music created for the Violin of the the Western musical The language I speak is thousands of years old and has a distinct quality separate and unique between and of Indigenous Languages of Australia. I interact with the Partitas by sounding language from my voice with the language spoken in different vernaculars and How the different motifs of language and music interact is what drives the improvisation and morphs the Partitas. I see the interaction of language and music and the resulting experience creating a space where the experiences of the performance interact and in a sense, share with each other. The music will play live and also through a looper which will be connected to Electric Fish Traps that serve as musical instruments made from recycled electrical cords. Feel free to listen to the Fish Traps.

GINDI **GIALLEBA-Turbine GIYAHNA Platform** (P t r a **GORDON HOOKEY** (AUS) T t e a

Gordon Hookey was born in Cloncurry Queensland and belongs to the Waanyi people. Hookey's work combines figurative characters, iconic symbols, bold comiclike text, and a spectrum of vibrant colours. Through this idiosyncratic visual language he has developed a unique and immediately recognisable style. Hookey locates his art at the interface where Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal cultures converge. He explicitly attacks the establishment and implicates our current political representatives. Hookey's visual aesthetic is breaking new ground with a foray into stop motion animation, as evident in his recent video Terraist.

CONSTANTINA BUSH (AUS)

Kamahi's artistic practices sit across visual arts, acting and singing. Born in Katherine, Northern Territory, Kamahi began painting and sketching at a young age, guided by his grandfather, a member of the Gurindji tribe, who was both a teacher and a mentor to young Kamahi.

Constantina Bush and Friends are bringing the heat to the stage and lighting fires in their audience's hearts. From a dusty outback cattle station, Constantina Bush has travelled the world and is bringing those stories to your t S a q e The Divine Diva has an incredible live band to create an evening of storytelling interwoven with the songs of the Motown era. With show-stopping tunes influential in her life, remarkable stories from her adventures and a touch of politics, this night could be described as "Priscilla Queen of the Desert meets the NT Intervention".

ROB RUHA (NZ)

With his award-winning music and evocative performances, Rob Ruha presents new album SURVIVANCE: from his must-see showcase of fresh music that shares intimate 'Survivance' stories of his Indigenous Māori nation. His new album with his band The Witch **Dr.** confirms the diversity of his gifts and in 2017 received the honor of being named as one of five Laureate Award recipients in the NZ Arts Foundation Awards. Rob is a highly acclaimed composer and artist of a new generation of Māori. He is a product of powerful kapa haka traditions and indigeneity, traditional rooted in knowledge, transforms it into contemporary works of music. His unique style of 'Haka-soul' music has been performed and embraced all over the world and his compositions can be heard everywhere from the marae to the kapa haka stage, from Spotify to international performance spaces and Disney smash hits like 'MOANA'.

RIA HALL (NZ)

With the release of her debut self-titled EP, Ria Hall became a blazing female force on the NZ music scene. Winning multiple awards and critical acclaim, her sound fused furious hip-hop beats and richly layered vocals in English and Te Reo Māori. October 2017 saw the release of her highly anticipated concept album entitled 'Rules Of Engagement'. In its first week of release, it debuted on The Official New Zealand Music Charts at #1. Featuring appearances and production from Tiki Taane, Kings, Laughton Kora, Mara TK and Electric Wire Hustle, the album showcase Ria's incredible talent as a vocalist and lyricist. Ria is a powerful live performer, who's set has seen her play to audiences of thousands at a number of festivals across Australasia. The live set is best described as an experience that showcases her enormous vocal range and ability to effortlessly transition between styles.

HANNAH BRONTË & FEMPRE\$\$ (AUS)

With his solo project only just beginning to gather speed, Kahl received the Dreaming Award at the 2015 National Indigenous Arts Awards, presented Australia Council for the Arts. by the Between recording as a solo artist, touring, participating in community projects, and working on his second record with The Medics, Kahl also works as a music mentor and healthy-lifestyle facilitator Jimmy Little Foundation. The with Kahl identifies with his grandfathers country, the Wuthathi Nation from the Cape York Peninsula, and his Grandmothers mob, the Lardil people from Mornington Island in the Gulf of Carpentaria. He takes his last name 'Wallis' from his great-great-grandfather of the Polynesian islands of Wallis and Futuna.

KAUMAKAIWA KANAKA'OLE (USA)

A modern transgender Hawaiian (mahu wahine), Kaumakaiwa Kanaka'Ole is a vibrant keeper of culture, an authentic innovator, as she engages Indigenous thought to address today's issues through music, chant, sharing of spirit and dance. With plenty of humor, she provides wry commentary and stories to give context to her songs. She was honored with an NACF (Native Arts & Cultures Foundation) Fellowship Award. In 2018, she was invited to be an Opening Plenary Speaker at the APAP's annual national conference in New York. With five Nā Hōkū Hanohano (Hawaijan Grammy) awards, Kaumakaiwa was first Hawaiian performer to appear at the prestigious Indigenous cultures festival The Dreaming in Australia; and the first performer Hawaiian to appear at globalFEST in New York.

SANGPUY (TAI)

Sangpuy Katatepan Mavaliyw, has often been described as a "young man with an old soul," because of his life journey and ethos in his song and life style. Sangpuy comes from a Pinyumayan Indigenous tribe - Katratripulr, in Taiwan's Pacific southeast coast. In Katatipulr, he learned Pinuyumayan music, language, culture and traditions.

MOE CLARK (CAN)

Métis multidisciplinary artist Moe Clark is a nomadic songbird with wings woven from circle singing and spoken word. Mistress of the looping pedal, her poetic songs resonate with the power to heal and to connect with authentic purpose. Originally from Treaty 7, she's called Tio'tia:ke / Montreal home for nine years. She's directed and produced multiple intercultural collaborative events including Transcestral: a musical exchange bridging Indigenous and Sufi musical traditions and in 2013 she directed the 10th Annual Canadian Festival of Spoken Word Montreal, highlighting **Indigenous** in languages. Moe has two albums of music, bilingual book of poetry and multiple performance videos and awards. Her work has been featured around the world at the Lincoln Centre (US), Queensland Poetry Festival (AU), Maelstrom Poetry Festival (BE) and Planet IndigenUs festival (CA), among others.

JOSHUA PETHER (AUS)

Joshua Pether is an emerging choreographer/ performer based in Western Australia. He is of Kalkadoon heritage and also identifies as having a disability. As a dancer he has worked for companies in both Australia and New Zealand and has toured both nationally and internationally. His practice works within dance and performance art giving audiences visceral and sometimes confronting experience. He is interested in the aesthetics of the disabled body and also that of the colonised body and finds that these two cultures when intertwined feed of each other to create new forms and ideas. Louise Potiki Bryant is of Māori (Ngāi Tahu, Kāti Mamoe, and Waitaha), descent who has choreographed for companies such as Atamira Dance Company, Black Grace Dance Company and The New Zealand Dance Company.

NGARO

(excerpt)

Choreographer / video artist Louise Potiki Bryant will be presenting an excerpt from her multi-media work NGARO, a visceral solo performance and video installation, with music by Paddy Free and textile design by Rona Ngahuia Osborne. NGARO (hidden, out of sight, lost) acknowledges the oftenhidden journey of losing oneself to a mental illness and reflects upon our collective wellbeing and consciousness from a Māori perspective. Revealed and concealed within the work is Hinengaro - the hidden feminine and deity of the mind. NGARO explores the necessary dulling our senses to cope with stimulation overload, and ultimately a reawakening to the ocean of consciousness.

BRIAN SOLOMON (CAN)

Award winning creator Brian Solomon is of Anishinaabe and Irish descent, born in the remote community, Shebanoning / Killarney, located in Northern Ontario, Canada. He has presented his multidisciplinary works in Berlin, Ingolstadt, Bamberg, Seville, Edinburgh, Amsterdam, Londonand across Canada. Brian is a graduate of the School of Toronto Dance Theatre, and holds a MA in Performance from the Laban Center in London, UK.

Jack Sheppard is of the Kurtjar clan of the Gulf of Carpentaria, North QLD. He is an artist driven by his culture, spirituality, and humanity. Jack studied at Naisda Dance College and WAAPA's Aboriginal Theatre Course.

Wild Australia

"Wild Australia was a show toured along the East Coast of Australia in 1892-1893. Archibald Meston, who later became 'Chief Protector of Aborigines', rounded up his "primitive natives" from Cape York, North Queensland, the Torres Strait Islands, and some from the Northern Territory, and toured them as a sideshow, where they performed their cultural dances and were a part of other theatre productions as well. They stopped in Brisbane, Sydney Melbourne. and In each city they were put into photo shoots, where they were dressed as Native policemen, and 'traditional attire', and were to re-enact killings between each other: A disturbing and traumatic experience for Aboriginal people during the time. When they arrived in Melbourne, Archibald Meston lost his financial support, and left the group stranded in Melbourne. It was then, that the group took power back into their hands, as they busked, their dances performing to their way back North to their homes. There were 22 men, 4 women, and one child. Recorded clan groups of Wild Australia: The Wakaya, Kuthant, Kurtjar, Arapa, Walangama, Mayikulan, Kabi Kabi, Kalkadoon and Muralag Peoples. A sound installation and performance created in collaboration with multidisciplinary artist Stefan Petersen. Drawing from experiences of visiting Pelican Falls Indian Residential where three generations of the School choreographer's family were forced attend, Kramer plunges the audience into a soundscape from her blood land with a minimal performance.
